### Connecting with AA in Santa Fe - Some Behind-the-Scenes Tips

Although the Friendship Club hosts a wide variety of recovery groups and activities 7 days per week, you might want to connect with recovery groups and activities outside the Club. Here are some options to explore as you search for *Alcoholics Anonymous* information, literature, and more.:

**AA World Services** provides the structure for self-supporting local service offices. *Santa Fe is part of Area 46, and identified as District 2,* in New Mexico.

**Start your search** for support and resources at https://nm-aa.org. This site provides ways to connect with AA if you need help related to Santa Fe recovery options and has information about Area and District events, activities, and ways to become a volunteer. It is well organized and worth a visit.

In the parking lot of the Friendship Club, you may have noticed a staircase leading to a door on the second story of the building. This door leads you to the meeting place for *Renacer*, the AA group "en Espanol" (6 pm on Monday – Friday) and houses the AA Central Office https://santafeaa.org/central-office/ for Area 46, District 2 in Santa Fe, providing an organizing hub for Area 46, District 2, and coordinates a variety of service opportunities. You can also obtain AA approved books and literature from this office, by email or phone: centraloffice@santafeaa.org,505.982.8932



### John Henry McDonald and A Guru Named Frank

The Friendship Club hosted a unique fundraiser in July, featuring "an original one-man musical performance and play" written by John Henry McDonald. The audience was treated to a lively blend of story-telling and original tunes; painting a vivid picture of one man's journey through drug addiction, alcoholism, and homelessness to a life of recovery

anchored by "A Guru Named Frank." His performance took about 10 years to develop: the songs and parts of the storytelling have changed a bit over time, although the core of his performance stays the same. Connecting with the audience is of utmost importance and he says, "sometimes I perform, and sometimes the performance plays me."

Given a choice in the late 1960's between jail or Vietnam, John Henry chose Vietnam. He returned from that war with a "brokenness" of spirit. Searching for a way out of that pain, he turned to drugs and alcohol and started down the dark path that so many of us know - addiction, homelessness, ruined relationships, and hopelessness. Yet, even in his darkest times he kept his love of folk, gospel, and blues music, along

with "a talent for telling a good story." He traveled on the road, opening for more well-known bands, finally landing in Austin, Texas. In 1973 John Henry put down the bottle and began his journey into sobriety with guidance from the man that he credits with saving his life, Frank Roberts. In his performance he paints a picture of Frank "in coveralls, with a pickup truck and holding a 45 automatic." When John Henry asks for help, Frank tells him to get a job, not a "gig" and leave that guitar behind. Later Frank tells him it is time to stop running and make a stand. He points out that John Henry has the precious gift of sobriety, "so don't blow it." John Henry calls Frank for help and advice for the next 34 years and counted on him for directions (never suggestions) such as "get a job" or "pray." Frank, with his brisk, no-nonsense style, and blunt instructions provided the lifeline John Henry needed on his journey to living a happy and productive sober life.

John Henry forged a successful career in financial services in Austin Texas for more than forty years, and now lives part time in Santa Fe, offering fundraising performances three or four times each year for a variety of causes. John Henry generously donated 100% of the \$1700 that was raised from his performance July 11, to the Friendship Club, and we are so grateful!

### Board Member Spotlight: Pat D.

Pat came to Santa Fe in 2023. Originally from NY, she and her sister drove cross country in 1975, ending up in Bellingham, WA. A week after arriving, she met her future husband (*in a tavern - love at first drink*) and they ended up in Seattle. She and her

husband became enthralled with Alaska and moved there.

Pat listened and became sober, recently celebrating 36 years of sobriety. Her husband also became sober, but unlike her, did not embrace the program. Pat's connection to Santa Fe began at a workshop at Upayah Zen Center, and she immediately felt a strong pull to this area. After her husband's death she decided to retire and move elsewhere. At the same time, she joined an online group, *Do It Sober*, on Zoom, and met two people from Santa Fe, which prompted another visit to the city. She moved here, once again following her inner voice and made good friends, one of which she recently travelled with to Scotland.

Pat was an active member of AA in Anchorage from 1989-2022. Once in Santa Fe, she found the Friendship Club, where she felt welcomed by friendly AA groups, discovered

a lot was going on, and also appreciated the parking at the club. She looked around for a way to volunteer, and became a FC board member, attending events in her role as greeter and organizer. She then joined the newsletter team, and continues to be an active member of our community.

Her story includes family alcoholism; her 'baby' sister became sober via AA, introducing Pat to the program. She also saw firsthand, as a nurse, the wreckage drinking brings to lives. She began to feel scared because she never knew what would happen while she was drinking. Her inner voice spoke again, telling her to get help or there might not be another chance; she made the choice to become sober and find structure in her life without drinking, found people to talk to, and created her own spiritual program. It seemed like a miracle, to join "her people". Kept coming back and stayed, another miracle.

Pat learned to seek spiritual solutions, pay attention to what's happening in her head, make amends, knows she needs to live in the slow lane instead of living in the fast lane. She experiences herself in a more integrated way, where her insides now match her outsides.








Removing alcohol and drugs won't suddenly fix all your problems but it will give you a chance to actually start working on them.


